Justine clearly explained the parametres of her position and welcomed input from members of FOIR. "Thank you" to all who gave input to this important document.

In 2014 the "Arid Lands President's Group" decided to form a small working party to develop 'Policies' for the various Friends Groups in this region. I have attended the four meetings held this year and believe that the documents being developed will be an important reference for all groups.

Through these meetings there has also been the opportunity to link with other groups such as, "The Great Tracks Cleanup" group. They are keen to link with FOIR to assist with working bee issues that we cannot manage, like cleaning up the mining mess.

We really appreciated the effort that our Ranger, Erik Dahl, made to attend our last meeting in 2014. Erik's attendance at meetings and his Ranger Reports mean that Members get first hand information on any issues relating to Innamincka. For

example, over 120 mm rail fell in January, with 88 mm of that being over four days, closing all roads for some days and many tracks for weeks.

They were successful and Erik forwarded photographs kindly Researcher, Adrian Mitchell in Sydney. Adrian was able to show these to the great, great Grandson of Henry Colless, the owner of the Original Innamincka Station. Henry's Great-Grandson was over-whelmed. He was in palliative care at the time, suffering from a brain tumor, and this was a dream come true for him.

In search of detail relating to the original homestead, I placed a call for information in "Westprint". I received a prompt reply from Ann Jones, a great great Grand-daughter of Henry Colless. Adrian Mitchell and the family had been trying to trace Ann for many years.

The story of "Wanamuchoo" – a Yawarrawarrka Man by Joan Osborne

Wanamuchoo was taken from Haddon Downs and sent to the Adelaide Asylum for the tribal killing of another Aboriginal man.

Wanamuchoo died after 9 years in the Asylum and his skeleton was sent to the University of Edinburgh, Scotland, in 1907. After much protest by his people, Wanamuchoo was eventually returned to Australia in 1991.

The repatriation and burial of Wanamuchoo occurred in 2006 through the Yandruwanda/Yawarrawarrka Traditional Landowners Aboriginal Corporation and the Museum of Adelaide.

However, between 2004-2006 Wanamuchoo rested in the AIM mortuary until being taken to his final resting place.

Innamincka Cemetery

Our interest in the 'Dead Centre' of Innamincka continues. I have met with the Anthropologist, Ian Moffat, who undertook the 'Ground Penetrating Radar' on the Cemetery in 2013, to discuss the preparation of an Anthropological paper on the Innamincka Cemetery. Work is under way on this "Paper" and you will receive a copy when it is complete.

Tony Magor suggested that I prepare an article on the Cemetery for the publication "Across the Outback". With the help of Megan Barker this article was duly published. Imagine my surprise when I received a phone call from "Talc Alf" of Lyndhurst, with information relating to the Innamincka Cemetery. There are two people who currently live in Lyndhurst who have a relative that is buried in the Innamincka Cemetery. I am in contact with these people and we will investigate the details further.

I did visit "Talc Alf' in July, but I think that he will be glad if he never sees me again – his ears are still ringing after a lengthy debate about the myths related to Burke and Wills!!

It is our aim to have a significant sign prepared for the Innamincka Cemetery, listing the names of all of the people who "may" be buried in the Cemetery, and perhaps some detail on these people where it is available.

In my quest for this information, having exhausted all avenues in South Australia, I went to Canberra in May, to the National Library.

The National Library holds all of the information relating to the Australian Inland Missions across Australia – 509 boxes of it! Fortunately, the boxes relating to Innamincka were grouped together, so research was manageable.

I spent 7 days reading every piece of documentation held — it was fascinating. The AIM was run by the Presbyterian Church. The Secretary, Miss Brodie, kept every piece of paper imaginable, receipts, invoices, notes, letters. It was a "stickybeaks" paradise! I couldn't believe that the poor Nursing Sisters of Innamincka were hounded by the 'tax man' — for the princely sum of 5/10!!! Their private lives were anything but..... Miss Brodie discovered that one of the Sisters was keeping company with a Roman Catholic and wrote to the Policeman telling him to deal with it!!!!

The cost of living in Innamincka was never cheap. The travel expenses of the first two Sisters to go up to Innamincka was £32, a fortune in 1929. The AIM building cost £7,000 - £1,500 of which was donated by Josiah Symon. Josiah did not pay for it all, as I had originally thought – but his generous donation resulted in the building being named the "Elizabeth Symon Nursing Home" after his wife. However, it did take Miss Brodie nearly two years to get the money out of Josiah.

The Sisters had to complete a "Quarterly Return" that listed the patience's name, illness, length of stay and follow up treatment. This form, as were the dictates of the racist policies of that time, was divided into three sections, White, Aboriginal, Half-caste. White people were treated in the ward, Half-castes on the verandah and the Aboriginal people in a separate 'shed'.


Donations for the Mission were gratefully received from noted folk like Sidney Kidman, but also from Aboriginal people and Afghan Cameleers.

When all Pastoral Stations bought radios the Flying Doctor was then available to all, as a result the AIM Innamincka closed in 1954.





Sister Dunn liked playing Golf — "I had been told that they did play the game at Innamincka, but I was unable to find out where the Golf Course was......"

•16-11-1953 roof blown off in gale of Aboriginal Ward.

1954

Every Homestead has wireless receiver so AIM not required. Police Station and Hotel both Closed.


This was the end of one of the 'lives' of Innamincka.

This heart-breaking letter was among the Innamincka Records in the National Library, Canberra.

Just how did this poor, starving boy, from the other side of the world, in still 'warravished' Germany, get to hear about Innamincka!

Obviously he had no idea where Australia, Innamincka was located. Nor, could he possibly have known, that getting many food items was often a problem for the Sisters themselves. They were all issued with "ration tickets" throughout the war. The remoteness of their location and the inclement climate mattered not to the War authorities.

I guess we will never know if Zwilling Karl received a "little, little box with foods" from Australia. The Sisters could not help, so they forwarded the letter to Miss Brodie, who was based in Sydney. I hope that Miss Brodie lived up to her Presbyterian ideals.



<u>Management Plan</u> – The Management Plan for the Innamincka Regional Reserves is still in the writing process. Thank you to all for your input. This document should be ready for publication next year.

<u>Friends of Parks AGM</u> - After many years of dedicated service, David Mitchell stepped down from the role of President. Duncan McKenzie, from the Gluepot Reserves, was elected in his place. We acknowledge David's significant contribution to the various "Friends Groups" and wish Duncan well in his new role.

Innamincka is the first place in Australia to have an approved IBA sign.

History

The myths surrounding Burke & Wills continue to perplex, in particular, the details relating to the death of Grey. Mr J McKinlay was the leader of the "Burke Relief Expedition" that left Adelaide on 16 August 1861.

[COPY OF LETTER BURIED AT LAKE MASSACRE.]

S.A.B.R. EXPEDITION.

October 23rd, 1861.

TO THE LEADER OF ANY EXPEDITION SEEKING TIDINGS OF BURKE AND PARTY:

Sir,

I reached this water on the 19th instant, and by means of a native guide discovered a European camp one mile north, on west side of flat. At or near this camp traces of horses, camels, and whites were found. Hair, apparently belonging to Mr. Wills, Charles Gray, and Mr. Burke or King, was picked from the surface of a grave dug by a spade, and from the skull of a European buried by the natives...... We do not intend to return to Adelaide, but proceed to west of north. From information, all Burke's party were killed and eaten.

I have, etc., JOHN MCKINLAY.
